If the hat fits!

During worship on Monday, Miss Smith wore a very smart hat. Hats sometimes tell us about a person. They can be part of a uniform and tell us what job or hobby a person has. A selection of children from the Reception class and Year 1, matched a variety of hats we associate with different professions or hobbies.

Does wearing the hat make the person a nurse, builder or police officer? If it isn't the hat, what is it? What about a crown? How does somebody get to be a king or a queen?

Wearing a crown doesn't make a person a king or queen. You become a king or a queen because of the family you are born into. When you are born into a royal family, you learn how to do the job as you grow up. It's not all crowns, palaces and fancy clothes. Being a king or a queen is about serving the country and people. King Charles visits people in hospitals, in schools, in towns and cities. He gives talks and encourages people. On 6th May he will be crowned king. He will wear the crown for the first time. King Charles will be crowned in a big church called Westminster Abbey, during a special service called a Coronation. The Coronation service shows that King Charles has been chosen by God to be king and to serve the country and people.

Promises

King Charles will make promises about the sort of king he will be and will ask God to help him keep his promises.

Anointing

Special prayers will be said, asking God to bless King Charles and help him to be a good king. If you watch the Coronation, King Charles will take off his fine robes and wear a plain white one. He will then have special, blessed oil put on his head in the shape of a cross. This is to show that King Charles is an ordinary person, like you and me, and he needs God's help to be king. The cross is special to Christians. It reminds them of the cross that Jesus, who they believe is the King of the whole world, died on.

Coronation I Spy

Look out for special objects during the Coronation

King Charles will be given special objects to hold to show that he is king. Look out for the Orb, the Sceptre and the Crown.

The Orb is a golden ball with a cross on the top. The ball stands for the world and the cross is a reminder that to Christians, that Jesus is King of the world and King Charles is king with Jesus' help.

A Sceptre is like a special stick. Look out for the cross on the Sceptre. The Crown is full of jewels. There is a cross on this too.

As king, King Charles will be a leader of Christians in this country. Christians believe that Jesus is the King of the whole world. King Charles wants to serve everyone whatever religion or race you are from.

So, sometimes when we wear a hat it shows the job or role we have been chosen to do. People are often chosen to do a job, they have to learn how to do jobs, they have to have the right skills and be willing to work hard.

It's the same with King Charles III. He has spent his whole life learning how to be king and he believes he has been chosen by God who will also help him to be a good king.

Wearable tech is increasingly big business. More than 170 million smartwatches were sold globally in 2022 for example, with Apple biting off the largest chunk of the market (26% - some distance ahead of Samsung, in second with 9%). That's partly because they have more than 21,000 apps available for their devices, allowing users to customise their smartwatch experience.

Both Apple and Samsung's products, of course, lean towards the higher spec end of the market – usually with price tags to match. Sourcing a less expensive alternative, however, often also means

inferior safety features to protect young wearers.
