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Advent

What are you looking forward to?

During Advent, Christians get ready to welcome Jesus. Advent calendars are one way of getting ready for Christmas. Advent wreaths are another way of counting down to Christmas.

Today during Advent, churches cover altars with a purple cloth. This is because in Jesus's time purple was the colour of kings.

During Advent, Christians wait and think back to when Jesus first came into the world. He didn't turn up out of the blue. People were watching and waiting for the Messiah, the one who would lead them closer to God. Over the four Sundays of Advent, Christians use the Advent wreath to help them think about the time leading up to the birth of Jesus.

How do you get ready to welcome Jesus?

The first candle on the Advent wreath, reminds us of the Patriarchs.

Patriarchs are people who have gone before us; everything we have, depends on the people who lived before our time- our ancestors.

Jesus's people, the Jews, looked back a very long way to a man called Abraham, who became the father of the nation of Israel, as God promised him. Our ancestors lived in different times and they had to struggle with some of the problems we have but also problems we don't have. It is thanks to their determination and courage that we can be here today. Inspiring, believing and achieving in our loving Christian community.

Grimsargh St Michael's C of E Primary School Choir will sing carols at the Christmas Extravaganza on Grimsargh Park.


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THANKYOU

Attendance (Education Hub- DfE)

Attendance at school is crucial to prepare young people for successful transition to adulthood, and to support their longer term economic and social participation in society. There is also evidence that the students with the highest attendance throughout their time in school gain the best GCSE and A level results.

Research found that pupils who performed better both at the end of primary and secondary school missed fewer days than those who didn't perform as well. For example, data from 2019 shows that 84% of Key Stage 2 pupils who had 100% attendance achieved the expected standard, compared to 40% of pupils who were persistently absent across the key stage. Pupils who have missed more than 10% of school sessions are considered persistently absent.

Is my child too sick to go to school?

It's usually appropriate for parents and carers to send their children to school with mild respiratory illnesses, including general cold symptoms like a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat. Children should stay at home if they have a high temperature (38C or above).

My child is anxious about going to school, should I send them in?

Children can sometimes feel a little bit worried about going to school. Mostly, this is a very normal emotion. It is important to recognise that going in to school can help children to feel less worried than letting them stay at home.

SAFEGUARDING

This free online safety guide outlines the key points of the Online Safety Act, a major new piece of legislation which became law in the UK in October 2023.

After a lengthy gestation period, the UK Government's wide-ranging changes to the legislation around digital safeguarding have become enshrined in law as the Online Safety Act. The first of its kind in Britain, the act aims to improve protection for children online and clamp down on illegal material. Regulated by Ofcom, it will primarily impact social media platforms and companies which host user-generated content.

The new legislation, however, also carries implications for schools and their staff. Although further developments are expected, our #WakeUpWednesday guide summarises the main points of the act that schools need to be aware of so far – outlining some specific areas that the new laws address and what effect, in practical terms, this will have on education providers.
